Reflections on Our Journey and Vision Ahead

It gives me great pleasure to present the 5th edition of our annual report, highlighting our journey of empowering women in rural Maharashtra to become self-reliant and financially independent over the last five years.

India's recent achievement of becoming the world's fourth-largest economy is indeed a milestone. Yet, one challenge remains stark — the unequal distribution of wealth. Nearly 70% of our population lives in rural areas and urban slums, earning less than ₹1.25 lakhs annually. They depend on agriculture, informal jobs, and seasonal work, with little access to reliable income or essential services.

Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam both envisioned India's progress rooted in strong, prosperous villages.

At NeevJivan Foundation, we work towards this vision by focusing on tribal women in Maharashtra, who have long faced systemic discrimination and exclusion. By equipping them with skills, resources, and opportunities, we help them break cycles of poverty and build pathways to dignity and growth.

Our contribution lies in enabling rural women to set up micro-businesses, making them financially independent today, and preparing them to join the formal workforce tomorrow as their enterprises scale into MSMEs.

Changing this mindset is crucial for bridging the economic disparity among the people living here and the success of our program in the long term.

These opportunities of sustainable livelihood (micro businesses) are not just alternate source of income, they are symbols of self-reliance, identity and pride.



Pandemic Forced A Nationwide Lockdown

March 2020 marked an unprecedented moment in our nation's history. As the pandemic forced a nationwide lockdown, most of us stayed safe within our homes, unsure of what lay ahead. But outside, another reality unfolded — thousands of migrant workers, stripped of livelihoods overnight, set out on heartbreaking journeys back to their villages. Images of overcrowded buses, trucks, and families walking or cycling hundreds of kilometers — some never making it home — shook us deeply.

It was then we realized: migration was not a choice, but a compulsion born of lack of opportunities in villages.

Something had to change. With this conviction, NeevJivan Foundation was born — to skill, re-skill, and empower tribal

women to build sustainable micro-enterprises in their villages. By addressing barriers of awareness, finance, deep-rooted social discrimination, we began creating dignified livelihood opportunities that reduce the need for migration and bring prosperity home.



Migration is a Tradition

Kaushalya lives in Modgaon village, about 130 km from Mumbai, with her three children and aging in-laws. Like every mother, she dreams of a secure home, good education for her children, and a healthy life for her family. But with agriculture as their only source of livelihood, survival has been a daily struggle. Water scarcity limits them to just one paddy crop during the monsoon, earning barely ₹60,000 a year — far too little for a family of seven.

For eight months annually, Kaushalya and her husband migrate to Silvassa, working as daily-wage labourers in brick kilns under harsh, exploitative conditions. The hardest part is leaving their children behind, growing up without parental care and exposed to exploitation.

Kaushalya's story reflects the reality of thousands of tribal women in Palghar and Nashik districts, trapped in poverty, discrimination, and limited opportunity. At NeevJivan Foundation, we empower these women with skills and resources, helping them build sustainable livelihoods and a future of dignity.





Reclaimed Identity

Aruna, a homemaker from Chinchale village, had been living a quiet life with her family for the past 15 years. With the support of MSRLM, she came together with like-minded women in her village to form a Self Help Group. Through our training in beekeeping, Aruna and her group were able to set up a small unit and step into the world of enterprise.

"Earlier, no one in my village knew us," Aruna shares. "But today, because of our beekeeping business, people across the taluka recognize and respect us. This initiative has given me and my group a new identity and dignity."

"What makes me most proud," Aruna says with a smile, "is when people speak well of us. We now believe that as our business grows, we will be able to spread our name and work across Maharashtra."














Self Reliance & Independence

Earlier, I depended entirely on my family's income.

In the quiet village of Asarwadi, Manisha's life once revolved entirely around household chores. With no personal income and limited opportunities, she often wondered if she could ever contribute financially to her family.

That changed when her group partnered with NeevJeevan Foundation, they received training on mushroom farming and business management. Equipped with new skills, the group started a mushroom farm on a small scale — a venture that now serves the village and generates income for its members. For Manisha, this meant more than just earnings; it brought a sense of pride, independence, and the confidence to dream bigger.

"Earlier, I depended entirely on my family's income. Today, I not only earn my own but also support my household. This has changed how I see myself," she shares with a smile.

Her journey is a testament to the power of opportunity and support. Manisha now hopes more women in her community will receive similar training so they too can stand on their own feet, support their families, and inspire change in others.






Micro Businesses Running 89

Over the last few years, we have implemented 89 livelihood projects in Jawhar, Dahanu, Vikramgad talukas in the Palghar districts and rural areas of Nashik district of Maharashtra.

Of these, 84 projects are running successfully by over 900 women in their villages (details indicated below). 5 of the projects that could not sustain themselves in the long run and have been redeployed among the existing mico businesses to increase their capacity.

Dreaming Big

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What started with hesitation soon turned into joy as they created bags, dresses, blouses, turbans, and traditional garments.

Six years ago, in Ekhlare village of Nashik, Vaibhavi gathered a small group of women who shared one simple dream — to create something of their own. With support from Mahila Arthik Vikas Mahamandal (MAVIM), they formed the Sri Krishna Mahila Bachat Gath. Though none of them knew tailoring, Vaibhavi patiently taught them, stitch by stitch, never letting them lose faith in themselves.

With the support of NeevJivan Foundation, which provided sewing machines and essential tools, their confidence began to bloom. What started with

hesitation soon turned into joy as they created bags, dresses, blouses, turbans, and traditional garments.

In just four months, their Community Tailoring Center achieved business worth ₹1.5 lakhs — income that now supports their families with pride and dignity.

"Today, I wear a sari bought with my own earnings," Vaibhavi says, her voice full of joy. Together, these women are not just stitching clothes — they are stitching dreams, hope, and a brighter future.

Vocations Taught

Over the last few years, we have developed a portfolio if over 24 different vocations that we teach our beneficiaries in association with our knowledge partners. However, we realised the need to rationalise the number of vocations in order to build subject matter expertise and efficiency in both the production process and market linkage.

We rationalised the vocations based on profitability of the micro business, availability of local markets to sell the products, popularity of the vocation and availability of expertise locally to support the micro business.



5-Step Approach



Access to Knowledge (Vocation of choice)

We teach vocations which are popular, profitable and have a thriving local market in collaboration with our knowledge partner Krishi Vigyan Kendra.



Access to Knowledge (Entrepreneurship Skills)

It's a 10 day module on basics of doing business based on Gandhi Ji's principles of "Nai Talim" where the focus is on wholesome work and experiential learning as the medium of knowledge sharing.



Access to Funds (Seed capital)

We empower women by securing crucial seed capital from government schemes, CSR initiatives, and loans, enabling them to start micro-businesses and build sustainable livelihoods, transforming their lives with dignity and hope.



Set up the Shop Floor

We guide women to set up their micro-businesses by providing technical knowledge, machinery, raw materials, branding, packaging, and regulatory support, transforming dreams into thriving, self-reliant ventures.



Guidance for 8-10 months to stabilise their operations

We recognise that most of the livelihood projects in rural areas fail due to lack of market linkages and hence I ensure maximum support on this front through online and physical distribution channels.

Today, we have 89 micro businesses being successfully run by over 900 women in their villages across Palghar & Nashik districts.



Financial Independence

For over 20 years, Vaishali lived in Kosbad village, depending on her husband to meet most of the family's needs. That changed when she and her friends discovered the untapped potential of processed chiku—a GI-tagged fruit of Palghar, grown abundantly in their village.

With training at Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Dahanu, and support from the Integrated Tribal Development

Project (ITDP) and NeevJivan Foundation, the group learned to make chiku chips, powder, and pickles, and went on to set up their own processing unit.

"Four years ago, we began with small steps. Today, our chiku processing center generates business worth Rs. 3,00,000 annually. With this income, I can support my son's education at the local ITI and proudly contribute to building our family's dream—a pucca house."

Our earnings are now sufficient to support our needs without depending on our families. We dream of making our brand known not just in our taluka or district, but across India.

Five years ago, with support from Maharashtra State Livelihood Mission (MSRLM), Vandana formed a Self-Help Group in Shevate village tucked deep in Vikramgad taluka roughly 150 Kms from Mumbai and began her entrepreneurial journey with just one agarbathi-making machine.

What started small soon grew into a thriving enterprise as the group experimented with multiple fragrances and different types of agarbathis. They steadily expanded their production capacity with support from NeevJivan Foundation and they acquired two more machines and scaled up their operations.

Today, they sell their products under the brand names "Mauli" and "Pankh."

"Our earnings are now sufficient to support our needs without depending on our families. We dream of making our brand known not just in our taluka or district, but across India—and even beyond. In the next 2—3 years, we are confident of reaching sales of Rs. 1 crore, and we are determined to achieve this."

NeevJivan Foundation has created a transformative impact in rural Maharashtra, bringing meaningful change to people's lives. By equipping women with vocational training and entrepreneurial skills, the foundation has empowered over 2,500 women through 210 Self-Help Groups in Palghar and Nashik. To date, 89 micro-enterprises have been launched, with 84 thriving successfully — enabling tribal women to move out of poverty and emerge as self-reliant entrepreneurs, breaking long-standing cycles of dependency.

Among its notable initiatives, the sanitary pad manufacturing project with the Katkari community has brought dignity and employment, while other programs such as poultry farming and the Neev Store's promotion of handcrafted products reinforce the foundation's commitment to sustainable livelihoods.

The impact is evident in rising household incomes, improved living standards, and reduced migration, with over 400 families choosing to remain in their villages. NeevJivan's work stands as a testament to grassroots empowerment, resilience, and community transformation.

Migration to Enterprise

Paru Tai and Tulshi Tai who moved to Chinchale village in Dahanu taluka after marriage 15 years ago, relying solely on farming to support their family of six. With limited water, they could cultivate only one paddy crop during the monsoon, earning just ₹50,000—₹60,000 a year—insufficient to meet even basic needs. To survive, they migrated to Silvassa for eight months annually, taking up strenuous jobs like brick-making, while their children remained behind.

Six months ago, with training and support from NeevJeevan Foundation, they ventured into mushroom farming. This new livelihood has given them a steady income, freedom from migration, and renewed hope. Today, they live with their children year-round and are already planning to expand their enterprise.


"With small success in the mushroom production, we have got the confidence to increase our business now and hope to sell our products all over Palghar very soon", said Paru tai during our recent visit to their village.

Dream Come True

Rohini belongs to a landless family in Asanagar, a small village in Jawhar, 130 kilometers from Mumbai, where survival meant living with uncertainty, hardship and deprivation. With very little income to rely on, she dreamed of building something that could bring stability and dignity to her family and her community. Guided by this vision, she brought together women from her village to form the Godu Tai Mahila Bachat Gath.

With determination and the support of NeevJivan Foundation, the group ventured into an unfamiliar but promising path — crab farming. What began as a small idea soon became a beacon of hope. For

the first time, the women saw an opportunity to earn steadily within their village, without being forced to migrate or depend on irregular work.

Today, the Crab Farming Unit is not just a livelihood project — it is a symbol of courage, resilience, and women rewriting their own destiny.
